

Waitaki Whitestone Aspiring Global Geopark - New Zealand

The New Zealand National Commission for UNESCO is writing in support of the application by Waitaki Whitestone to become a UNESCO Global Geopark and to join the UNESCO Global Geoparks Network.

The area of the proposed Geopark covers 7214 km², home to 22,000 people living in small communities and many areas of interest including metamorphic, sedimentary, and volcanic features, along with Cenozoic fossils. The Vanished World Centre has been a popular fossil park and trail for 17 years, drawing visitors of all ages.

If successful, Waitaki Whitestone will be New Zealand's first UNESCO Global Geopark and the only for Australasia, offering geographic balance to the present distribution of geoparks. The proposed Geopark is uniquely New Zealand in nature due to its firm foundation in Te Ao Māori (recognising the place of the people of the land).

In 2017, the New Zealand National Commission for UNESCO established an independent Expert Advisory Panel (EAP) to encourage, support and advise New Zealand nominations for UNESCO Global Geopark status.

Chaired by Dr Geoff Hicks (Natural Sciences Commissioner, New Zealand National Commission for UNESCO), the other members are Dr Hamish Campbell (Emeritus Scientist, GNS Science), Dr Bruce Hayward (Geoheritage Consultant and Convenor of the New Zealand Geopreservation Inventory), David Bamford (Specialist and Consultant in tourism management, parks and recreation planning and small business development) and Holden Hohaia (General Manager Māori Development, Manaaki Whenua Landcare Research).

On behalf of the Otago Regional Council, I am pleased to provide this letter of support for the Waitaki Whitestone Geopark Trust's application for UNESCO Global Geopark Status.

The Otago region is the second largest region in New Zealand with 40% of the Waitaki district located within Otago.

Otago features a wide range of stunning geography, ecosystems and historic character. The Waitaki district is no exception as it is rich in geologic diversity and features, biodiversity, culture and history. The district, and its coastal urban centre of Oamaru, are important historic Otago settlements for both our Māori and European ancestors. Within Otago, the Māori iwi (tribe) associated within a defined takiwā (area) of the Waitaki district is Te Rūnanga o Moeraki.

Whatungarongaro te tangata toitū te whenua

As man disappears from sight, the land remains

Māori proverb speaking to the holistic values of Māori, and the importance of having respect for Papatuanuku, or Earth mother from which all living thing originate.

Human activity has left its mark on the landscape. Māori archaeological sites, hydro lakes, tailings and bridges from the gold rush era, pastoral landscapes, and historical architecture all provide evidence of long, rich and varied human occupation through the Waitaki district.

The distinct 'Oamaru Whitestone' is a limestone that is associated with the Waitaki district and evident in many of our beautiful historic buildings, not just within the district but around New Zealand. The famous Moeraki Boulders/Te Kaihīnaki are another natural geological attraction which have cultural significance and are valued by the people of the Waitaki district.

Oamaru features many beautiful and restored examples of Victorian architecture, showcasing the district's historic preference for using the Whitestone resource. This Victorian history and culture has enabled Oamaru to innovate itself as the Steampunk capital of New Zealand and attract many visitors.



Letter of Support

The University of Otago is delighted to endorse the application of the Waitaki Whitestone Geopark to become a member of the UNESCO Global Geoparks Network.

Founded in 1869, the University of Otago was New Zealand's first university. We are looking forward to celebrating our 150th birthday in 2019, and to the involvement of wide sectors of our local and regional communities in our celebrations. The University opened in July 1871 with a staff of just three Professors, one to teach Classics and English Language and Literature, another having responsibility for Mathematics and Natural Philosophy, and the third to cover Mental and Moral Philosophy and Political Economy. The following year a Professor of Natural Science joined the staff, James Gow Black, who travelled widely across the Otago region, giving popular talks on his specialist areas of geology and chemistry to schools, miners and other members of the public. Lectures in Mining were given at the University from 1872, and in 1878 a School of Mines was established.

We have a nationally distinct approach to the provision of teaching, research and service that draws on our history, our vision as a research-led university with an international reputation for excellence, and a mission which is anchored in a number of core institutional values. As a national university operating in an international context, we attract a diverse range of students from throughout New Zealand and from over 100 nations around the world.

The vast majority of our more than 20,000 students commence their studies as undergraduates on our main Dunedin campus. However, we also operate significant health sciences campuses in Wellington and Christchurch, specialist facilities in Auckland and Invercargill, and satellite facilities elsewhere in New Zealand. We also deliver a number of programmes (mainly in postgraduate health sciences) via distance learning, both nationally and offshore.

Built on our heritage in mining and earth sciences, Otago University now hosts the National School of Surveying and has one of New Zealand's strongest and most highly regarded Departments of Geology. This Department is recognised internationally for the quality and

breadth of its research and its graduates, and for its strong links to the mining industry and to the special geology of the Otago-Southland region. The Department's research is linked strongly to the dynamic geology of New Zealand, with particular emphasis on process-related research tied to the "active" geology of the South Island, and to the evolution of our unique New Zealand biota.

The Geology Department has had a lengthy association with 'Vanished World', a geopark within the Waitaki district that has been operating for 17 years. As a result of this strong research and educational association with the current geopark, we are confident that the proposed Waitaki Whitestone UNESCO Global Geopark will be a success and also add significant opportunities for enhanced international collaboration in geoscience research and education.

The establishment of the Waitaki as a UNESCO Global Geopark will lead to a marked increase in numbers visiting the global geopark, and an increased opportunity for visitors to appreciate the unique geology of this area, and to engage in understanding of the geosciences, the complex landforms involved, and their interaction with biodiversity and sustainability.

We strongly recommend the Expert Advisory Panel and the New Zealand National Commission for UNESCO to approve the application of the proposed Waitaki Whitestone UNESCO Global Geopark to join the UNESCO Global Geoparks Network.

LETTER OF SUPPORT - UNESCO GLOBAL GEOPARK ACCREDITATION

Lincoln University is delighted to support the efforts of the Waitaki Whitestone Geopark to gain UNESCO Global Geoparks accreditation.

Researchers and students at Lincoln University have had a long standing interest in the Waitaki Valley. This interest originates in the work of the Tussock Grasslands and Mountainlands Research Institute, and the leadership of past staff at Lincoln, including the late Professor Kevin O'Connor. Under the auspices of the UNESCO Man and the Biosphere Programme (MAB), in the late 1970s and early 1980s, Lincoln University produced a number of reports relating to environmental planning issues in the area. In an overview of this original research programme, and discussion of issues for planning in the Waitaki, O'Connor and others posited an approach to planning that considers natural and social systems together, to identify the opportunities and limits of natural resources and the objectives of the people and communities who use them.

Current research interest at Lincoln University is in the sustainable development of the Waitaki and linked to the activities of staff and students in the newly developed *Centre of Excellence: Sustainable Tourism for Regions, Landscapes and Communities.* The Centre devotes multi-disciplinary research to the conceptualisation, designing and testing of innovations with the greatest potential to help grow the value of tourism and enrich the tourist experience, while simultaneously restoring, protecting and enhancing the integrity of landscapes and ecosystems, and the social and cultural values of destination communities. The Waitaki Valley is one of the Centre's 'living regional research laboratories' providing opportunities for staff and students to test their ideas in a real world context.

Lincoln University's *Centre for Excellence: Sustainable Tourism for Regions, Landscapes and Communities* is confident that the proposed Waitaki Whitestone UNESCO Global Geopark will be a success - making an important contribution to the aspirations of the Global Geopark Network, while also having a positive impact on the local economy, natural landscapes, geo-heritage and diverse communities of the Waitaki.

Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga

On behalf of the members of the Board and Māori Heritage Council we thank you for meeting us when we visited Oamaru two weeks ago. We were very impressed with the wide range of heritage properties and stories that exist within Waitaki and Oamaru. Your aspirations for the statuses of National Historic Landmark and UNESCO Global Geopark for Waitaki Whitestone caused us much thought and there has been much to reflect on.

The Oamaru Historic Area (Category 1 on the Rarangi Korero Heritage List 7064) has been approved by the Associate Minister of Arts, Culture and Heritage, Hon Grant Robertson, to be considered for acknowledgement as a National Historic Landmark, Ngā Manawhenua o Aotearoa me ōna Kōrero Tūturu. The purpose of the National Historic Landmark status is to promote the conservation of significant historical and cultural heritage through advice, capacity building, advocacy, regulation, ownership of selected properties and providing targeted incentive funding. It also requires engagement with heritage owners, iwi and hapū, heritage professionals, the public, councils and government on heritage. Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Toanga is committed to work with all of the interests associated with the Oamaru Historic Area, including the Waitaki District Council, to progress this work. In time the culmination of this work will be a recommendation to the Associate Minister seeking his agreement to the National Historic Landmark, Ngā Manawhenua o Aotearoa me ōna Kōrero Tūturu, for the outstanding national heritage value of the Oamaru Historic Area.

As mentioned at the time of our meeting, we were very impressed with the aspirations of the Waitaki District Council for the status of UNESCO Global Geopark for Waitaki Whitestone. As you are aware, UNESCO seeks to acknowledge single, unified geographical areas where sites and landscapes of international geological significance are managed with a holistic concept of protection, education and sustainable development. We believe that Waitaki Whitestone Geopark application meets the criteria for this internationally important status. You are blessed with diverse landscapes ranging from alpine areas to rolling downlands, braided river plains, sea cliffs, flat topped mesas, karst topography and prominent volcanic peaks, all of importance to what UNESCO Global Geopark looks to acknowledge.

We were quite taken by the potential of geo-gastronomy and see this as something unique that could be quite differentiating for the Waitaki Whitestone UNESCO Global Geopark proposal.

We believe that there would be very broad benefits including education, employment, tourism and economic growth. It is difficult for us to be in a position to quantify these benefits, but our experience across heritage properties from all of New Zealand suggests that they could be significant, particularly if connected to a national recognition such as National Historic Landmark and an international recognition such as the UNESCO Global Geopark.

Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga is the owner, on behalf of the Crown, of two very important properties being Totara Estate and Clarks Mill that are within the geographical proposal of the Geopark. We see potential in the future development of these properties, along with Matanaka, another property that is just south of the proposal area, in line with the concepts that the Waitaki Whitestone Global Geopark proposes.

We are well aware of all that it takes to progress applications for such statuses as those aspired to by the Waitaki District Council and others and then to manage these in the future. We are committed to assist where we can with these matters, including where possible to progress, with and for you, opportunities to secure funding. The critical step here is regular communication and awareness of the progress sought and the requirements to realise.

Waitaki and Oamaru have a very unique opportunity that would be the envy of others throughout New Zealand. We wish you well for the important next steps; importantly we are committed to support your endeavours.

Letter of Support - Waitaki Whitestone Geopark

Meridian is pleased to support Waitaki District Council's application to the UNESCO Global Geoparks Network.

Meridian is one of New Zealand's largest companies. It is New Zealand's biggest renewable electricity generator producing around 30% of New Zealand's electricity. Meridian is committed to sustainability, taking inspiration from the UN Sustainable Development Goals. It is one of the few New Zealand companies listed on the Dow Jones Asia-Pacific Sustainability Index.

The Waitaki Hydro Power Scheme is located on the Waitaki River system within and adjacent to the northern boundary of the proposed Waitaki Whitestone Geopark. This is Meridian's largest renewable electricity generation asset consisting of six hydro power stations.

The Waitaki Whitestone Geopark application aligns with many of the activities (including partnerships) that Meridian participates in. This includes Meridian's:

As New Zealand's dedicated earth science research institute, one of GNS Science's core purposes is to increase New Zealand's resilience to natural hazards such as earthquakes, volcanoes, landslides and tsunamis. The establishment of a UNESCO Global Geopark in the Waitaki district aligns with this purpose, as the Geopark's primary goals include engaging the public in understanding of earth science themes, increasing awareness of natural hazards and climate change, and making scientific knowledge accessible to everybody.

The Geopark will provide an avenue to deliver education and outreach services to the wider New Zealand and international visitor communities. It also shares with GNS Science common objectives around achieving mutual success through collaboration with iwi/Māori, partnering through our collaborators in research and commercial initiatives.
